A Short History



Ballyoran Primary School in 1974

Ballyoran Primary School was officially opened on 3rd September 1974 by Canon FW Gowing, Chairman of the Southern Education and Library Board.

The school which was a modern design for the time was to replace local smaller schools such as Park Road.

The building design was unique to the Craigavon area and is exactly the same as two other local primary schools - Drumgor and Tullygally.

The layout of the building remained largely unchanged until a major refurbishment took place in 2012 which transformed the accommodation.

Official Opening of Newly Refurbished School



Education Minister, John O'Dowd, has attended the official opening of a new £500,000 refurbishment at Ballyoran Primary School in Portadown - Wednesday, 13 June 2012

During the event Minister O'Dowd unveiled a plaque to mark the occasion and a blessing was carried out by Parish Priest, Fr Michael O'Dwyer. The works which commenced in November 2011 included the relocation of the nursery unit to brand new state of the art and modern accommodation to allow it to become a more integral part of the main school building. A brand new suite of Foundation Stage classrooms for P1 and P2 as well as the refurbishment of the entrance area, the provision of a new library and new toilet facilities as well as additional resource and storage space.

Following a tour of the school the Minister said: "It is a pleasure to be in Ballyoran Primary School today to celebrate the completion of their £500,000 refurbishment project. I had previously visited the school in October last year just before the refurbishment works kicked off so I can clearly see just how much of an impact these improvements have made."

The Minister also commented on the music and





dance performance provided by the pupils: "As I visit schools across the north I am continually amazed by the fantastic talent displayed by our children and young people. That talent has been in evidence yet again here today at Ballyoran and I would like to thank the school choir, the instrumental group, the Irish dancers and all the children for their great welcome and the entertainment they have provided."

"I also welcome the fact that Ballyoran Primary School is represented by many different cultures and nationalities so it was particularly good to hear the beautiful singing from a group of Polish children at the school."

In conclusion the Minister said: "I would like to thank the school Principal, Richard Woolsey for inviting me to participate in this special event today. As we approach the end of the school year I also want to acknowledge the hard work and dedication of all those involved with Ballyoran Primary School and I hope that all the staff, pupils and their families have a relaxing and enjoyable summer break."



Opening of Community Learning Centre

Thursday 11th October 2012



The Minister for Social Development, Mr Nelson McCausland was in Portadown to officially open the new Community Learning Centre at Ballyoran Primary School on Thursday 11th October 2012.

The new facility comprises an ICT Suite, multi purpose Community Room, Interview Room, toilets, changing rooms and baby changing facilities.

The Community Learning Centre is used by the school during the day and is available for the local community to use both inside and outside school hours. Blossom Surestart are already using the Community Room three days each week to house one of their In Tune Programmes for Two Year olds and the school has hosted an ICT Beginner's Course for adults.

Mr McCausland said: "Ballyoran Primary School is well known for its welcoming, friendly atmosphere and its happy, caring, safe and stimulating learning environment and I am pleased to experience this at first hand this morning."

"Too many people continue to experience barriers to employment because of a lack of qualifications. I am determined to help remove these barriers. Education is one of the issues which must be addressed if we are to tackle the cycle of deprivation in the three Neighbourhood Renewal Areas in Craigavon, and greater parental





involvement in children's educational development is a key factor.

"The Community Learning Centre at Ballyoran Primary School will not only facilitate such engagement but it will also provide a local venue through which parents might be encouraged to undertake adult education courses in more familiar surroundings."

The centre, costing in excess of £140,000, was financed through the Department for Social Development's Neighbourhood Renewal Investment Fund, with an in kind contribution of approximately £13,000 from the Southern Education and Library Board.

The Minister concluded: "To date my Department has assisted the Southern Education and Library

Board and the Southern Regional College to provide a range of education and training programmes in the three Neighbourhood Renewal Areas in the Borough of Craigavon. These programmes span the entire age spectrum, from primary school, to secondary school to adult education. I am confident they will help address the economic, educational and social problems facing residents in these communities and will, in time, contribute to an increase in prosperity and quality of life."

The Principal Mr Richard Woolsey in his speech thanked the many people who had supported him in making the vision of a Community Learning Centre at Ballyoran Primary School a reality. He paid tribute to the Portadown Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership and in particular its Chairperson Mrs Margaret Connolly who was pivotal in bringing this project to fruition. He also thanked Mrs Nicola Mitchell, Project Officer from the SELB for her support.

Mr Woolsey stated "Ballyoran Primary School is a school at the centre of the community, it exists to serve the people of this community and we are very excited about the opportunities that this new facility gives us to further strengthen the links with the local community."

Those were the days

A former Principal recalls his own schooldays

I have been so impressed by the wonderful facilities and stimulating educational environment at Ballyoran School that I cannot help but tell you about my own schooldays.

Our family School was Ballinacorr and my father often told us what it was like when he went there 115 years ago. It had two rooms, two teachers and 110 children when they were all present. He was six when he started and 12 when he left. He was kept at home half time to help his father so he had only between three and four years' schooling all together. How he learned so much in so short a time is beyond my understanding. He was the honorary veterinary surgeon for the many of the local small farmers who couldn't afford a qualified 'vit' (vet).

The Churches owned the schools and hadn't enough money to run them. The main infant play material was plasticine and each child had a slate and chalk for sums. Much time was spent on handwriting, tables, spellings and grammar. Long narrative poems and Bible passages were memorized for later recall and understanding. Two hours a week were given to life skills, particularly housewifery and basic rural practices. Children brought turf for the winter fire. They were often barefoot in summer or wore wooden clogs which were cheaper than shoes. Lunch was a jam sandwich which was called a 'piece.'

The Mistress taught Junior and Senior Infants and First and Second Class in the wee room. The Master taught Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth and Seventh in the big room. Families were generally large and parents and teachers had to enforce immediate obedience to survive. It was "spare the rod and spoil the child."

When I started Ballinacorr School in 1936 the situation had changed utterly. Enrolment was down because families had moved into Portadown and Lurgan to be nearer work. Two teachers taught 33 children up to the age of 14. The School had been transferred from the Methodist Church to County Armagh Education Committee. Education was centrally administered and more liberally financed. No more turf! John Reavie, a senior pupil who had a pony, got out of School to bring the coal from Shillington's. The building had changed very little but educational provision had significantly



improved. Though the wide age and ability range still existed it was now possible to give children individual attention. Slates were gone and there was less rote learning. Reading materials were improved, enhanced by a County Library Service. Regular attendance was enforced by School Attendance Officers. Older folk will remember the legendary Dick Little who performed his unpopular task without fear or favour. Though it was the hungry thirties people had what was known as a roughness of money and children were better fed and clothed.

I learned next to nothing for nearly two years until the School Doctor discovered that I needed glasses. Mr. F J Clarke of Bridge Street fitted me out. Although rotting teeth may not have affected learning unduly the visit of the School dentist was a communal disaster. The cloakroom became his surgery from whence our screams traumatized the whole school. The few who didn't scream got a penny.

Ballinacorr School was what it was because of its size and the genius of the Master. To his

many talents was added an unusual gift. He knew instinctively when children were receptive and at such times he taught more in an hour than the rest of us would in a week. He brought to education the universal principle that “to everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven.” The cultivation of the inhospitable school garden was the perfect exemplar. Clay soil can only be dug in kindly weather - a time for every purpose. The Time Table, pinned on the end of the book press (cupboard), published the principle unambiguously. “Horticulture may be taken according to the dictates of the Almighty.” Inspectors duly noted the divine reality for Horticulture and the achievements of the pupils proved that it had been successfully extended to the entire curriculum. Another interesting feature was block teaching. Lengthy sessions at one subject resulted in immediate consolidatory learning. If it meant staying to 4 o’clock so was it.

His summary execution of intruders ranged from inspectors to the ordained. He thought that clergymen were better occupied in the pulpit than in the classroom. He reckoned that theological language was inappropriate for the primary mind. When an inspecting clergyman became technical he would be invited to re-ask his question in an intelligible form and then answer it in language that children could understand.

We did a Shakespeare play annually. I can recall at least three. Each was introduced by the prose version for children from the delightful ‘Lamb’s Tales from Shakespeare’ by Charles and Mary Lamb. We knew the story before we started the original. Passages were again committed to memory.

At non-receptive times he played football and cricket with us. He was a disciple of Wally Hammond whom many considered to be the finest English cricketer of his generation and who was said to field like an archangel. He played rugby for Portadown and North and shared, with others, the distinction of having been knocked out by Blair Mayne, the Irish rugby International and British Lion. During the War Paddy Mayne became a founding member of the SAS and won

four DSOs. He was a rumbustious character subject to uncontrollable rages. Many believe that he was denied a VC because he had knocked out a commanding officer.

The Master was a fine violinist and guitarist. We were familiar with traditional folk songs from America, England, Ireland Scotland and Wales and, being wartime, were taught The Marseillaise in French. He entered us for all sorts of classes in Portadown Festival. The best-known competitor of the time was Gloria Joy Gordon from Belfast. When she came back as an adjudicator 40 years later one of the children she remembered was a small fair-haired boy with glasses. The phone rang in Ballyoran. I went up to the Town Hall and we had a cup of coffee during an interval.

When I reached 12 his suggestion that I be entered for a scholarship created a domestic crisis. My mother supported him. My father did not. He wanted me to come home to help him at 14 as he had helped his own father. The extended family supported my mother and my father reluctantly surrendered. Two years later my brother did the same examination without any fuss.

Ignorance was bliss. There was none of the generated stress that presently accompanies the 11 Plus. But I did have a secret concern. The examination was in Portadown and I had never been in town on my own before. I needn’t have worried. The Master left school and brought me in and out in his Morris 8.

I have just remembered that he called us Philistines. The Oxford English Dictionary tells me that the word means uncultured. He used language precisely. Those were the days and I recall them with affection and gratitude.

Ballyoran Primary School 40th Anniversary Congratulations

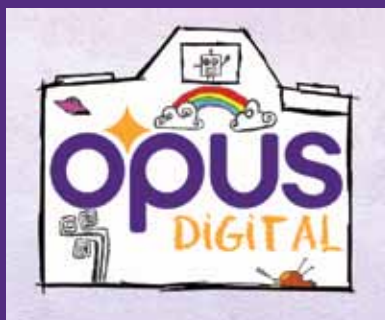

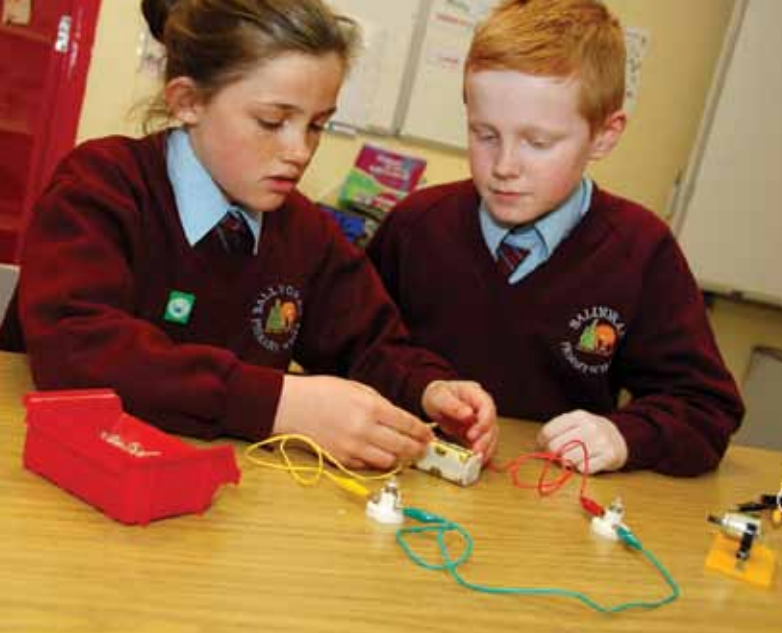
